7. New Business

7.1. Meeting format preference moving forward (in-person and/or Teams)

 With restrictions being lifted, meetings can resume in-person, remain on Teams, or can have the combination. But the challenges with the combination of teams and in-person, is that some cannot hear very well.

Discussion:

- one parent, who is a single parent prefers Teams as they can log in at any time with their kids at home.
- some parents would prefer to have the option to have Teams.
- Another parent likes both options, at Chinook, there was a combination, there was technical issues, however having both would be a great option. In-person, there is better conversations and to be inclusive to parents who want to be there to offer both.
- Some parents prefer the in-person conversations, are able to focus better.

Take Away:

S.R. will take this back and look at the technology options look like and see if we can do
combination meetings and ensure that it's a good quality meeting to ensure everyone has a
voice.

Question: where is the in-person meeting?

Answer: it is in the Board Office in the Board Room; it comfortably seats 15 people.

7.2. Physical Violence in the school – where are the policies in regard to Physical Violence

- The policies are listed in the '500 Students' policies, the information around student behavior and consequences start at 502.1 through to 502.1.11.

8. Engagement Fund Discussion (opportunity to share ideas councils have come up with to utilize the funds) – S.R. Discussion on ideas with how Schools plan to use the \$500 grant:

• One parent has children in 3 schools and each school plans on using it on a presentation on mental health and each school at kids age level.

Question: When does the grant expire?

Answer: The grant expires at the end of the school year (June) and if a school chooses not to use it, that money will not be available any further, the \$500 will be sent back to the provincial government.

- At Agnes Davidson, they are looking at offering Parent French classes.
- There was a suggestion, sometimes an instructor or presentation is more than \$500, School Councils could pool their money together. For example, bring in Bonnie Stelmach could come in and talk/presentation.
 - o Bonnie Stelmach has done a lot with Parent engagement and throughout the pandemic, she has a lot of great information on parent engagement.
 - She does presentations on building School Community.

- Board Leadership offers some amazing opportunities to learn about how Boards and Councils work, how to write grants, Roberts Rules of Order, etc.
- There is a session with Debbie Pushor, March 24th, called 'Join the Gentle Revolution'.
 - Tickets are under \$20 each, so if your school is looking to spend those funds and use to see Debbie Pushor, which would be a great use of the \$500.

- Wilson Middle School is having an engagement evening and are having agencies, sports
 organizations, Jump Starts, etc.... come into the school and allowing parents to have
 contact with agencies that they haven't had contact with due to Covid. This is an
 opportunity for Parents to see what is available, what are the costs, what are the dates.

Question: Most of those agencies wouldn't charge for that event, so you can't use the grant for refreshments, so how would you spend the money?

Answer: for an event like that, you may not be able to spend the money, but you could have the community even as a jumping point to engage with Parents. It would be nice if you could use \$100 for refreshments as that is how to get people in the door. Alberta Education doesn't allow that currently.

Question: The \$250 from the Division to send folks to the ASCA, could that be used for parent engagement? Also, if you didn't use the \$250 last year, can you use last years and this years towards parent engagement?

Answer (Trustee A.P): Yes, the \$250 can be used for parent engagement instead of sending parents to ASCA. Need to clarify if that money can be used to spend money on refreshments.

Clarification (addition to the Minutes): it has been clarified that the \$250 can be used for refreshments, however the goal is to use it for the engagement of parents. Also, the \$250 is not returned to the Divisions, the schools retain the \$250 and can be use cumulatively.

• School Council Community Engagement Funding from Alberta Education will be a standing agenda item to generate some ideas.

2. Board Priorities Report

The Division Office Leadership Team is committed to keeping the Board informed regarding progress in Board priority areas. The priority areas as identified by the Board at their spring retreat are attached. The Education Centre Leadership Team is currently working on the development of strategies to address the priorities. An update on progress will be provided in the form of a report each month starting in the October Board meeting.

3. COVID Highlights

The Board reviewed the current COVID context.

4. Edwin Parr Nominee

The Lethbridge School Division nominee for the 2022 Edwin Parr Award is Ashley Zrim, a Grade 1 teacher at Senator Buchanan Elementary School.

5. Provincial Champions

Provincial champions were invited to attend the Board meeting.

LCI Wrestlers:

Payton Shields took gold in the female 61-kilogram division, while Tamryn Bly earned gold in the female 47-kilogram division.

On the male side, Nolan Gobiel was golden in the 120-plus kilogram division, while Solomon Prenevost (68 kg) and Ethan Boehme (56 kg) took bronze in their respective categories.

Ryder Lowry earned a fourth-place finish (90 kg), while Jager Sommerfeldt (59 kg) and Tyler Saruwatari (98 kg) were both fifth in their divisions.

Rawley Selk (62 kg) and Briggs Butler (72 kg) earned sixth-place finishes.

Pat Selk and Riley Ellis Toddington coached the LCI wrestlers.

She also provided a brief update regarding the status of curriculum implementation as announced by the province and plans to support teachers with new curriculum implementation.

9. 2023/2025 Capital Plan

10. Victoria Park Upgrade Project

The Board approved that administration may proceed with the Victoria Park Upgrade project on a phased-in approach provided the project is approved for Capital Maintenance and Renewal (CMR) funding from the Alberta Government. The Board further authorizes administration to supplement the project with Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal Funding as required based on available funding.

11. Full day all week Kindergarten

The Board will form a committee to work on writing a resolution to bring back to the Board and if they agree, to present at the ASBA Fall General Meeting for provincial government funding support for full day all week Kindergarten.

12. Curriculum Advocacy

The Board will write a letter to Minister Adriana LaGrange with a cc to all Board Chairs expressing dissatisfaction with the timelines and roll out of the curriculum.

13. Welcome Back Event

The Board will host a come-and-go pancake breakfast with a virtual greeting from the Board to be shared at staff meetings.

14. Public School Boards' Association of Alberta (PSBAA)

Trustees discussed attendance at the PSBAA Spring General Assembly in Red Deer, June 2-4, 2022. It was recommended that we send as many Trustees as would like to go to the PSBAA Spring General Assembly from June 2-4, 2022, with the intent of looking at further membership in the fall. This will come out of personal professional development funds.

15. Letter to Minister LaGrange re: Fuel Prices

Trustees received information on the rising costs of fuel and recommended that the Board Chair write a letter on behalf of the Lethbridge School Division to Minister LaGrange requesting that Alberta Education reimplement the fuel price contingency fund to support school divisions with the fluctuating costs of fuel.

16. Community Conversations

Trustees will host the next event on Wednesday, April 13, 2022 from 8:30 to 10:00 am at the YMCA which provides a play area for children.

17. Structure of Board Meetings

The Board determined that members of the public would be welcome to attend in-person and Microsoft Teams will also be available.

18. ASBA Spring General Meeting

Board Chair Allison Purcell highlighted what Trustees can anticipate for meetings and learning sessions at the ASBA Spring General Meeting being held June 6-7, 2022, in Red Deer.

19. Board Funding Support to School Councils

Currently, the Board provides funds to support one parent's registration cost at each school to attend the Alberta School Council Association Annual (ASCA) General Meeting held each spring.

The Board pays for each School Council membership fee to Alberta School Council Association.

Additionally, the Board allocates \$250.00 annually to each School Council for the purpose of supporting additional costs incurred by a parent attending the ASCA AGM, or to support learning of the School Council (e.g. book a School Council learning session with ASCA or another organization). The \$250.00 can continue to target School Council learning or be used in other ways for events that target parent engagement.
