- Approval of the Minutes from May 2, 2022 Approved and Accepted as present with the additions.

A comment from a parent was missed on the minutes of the last meeting, where that parent had stated that the Division "learned from last year" and "I am thrilled with the changes" and [the Division is] "not going to please everyone".

7. Engagement Fund Discussion (sharing success for this year/ ideas for next year)

- Mike Mountain Horse Elementary School:
 - Parents had a numeracy night, where the Principal and Vice Principal did a
 presentation about numeracy, discussing the differences of what kids are learning
 now in comparison to what the parents learned in school.
 - There were 3 stations with activities for parents to do numeracy learning
 - Parents got a package to take home, such as dice, cards, pieces of papers with snakes and ladders, 100's charts, etc.... for parents to do at home with their kids.
 - Next year they are planning on a literacy night and some parent engagement nights on a regular basis.

Question: How was the money spent?

Answer: not 100% sure, they spent money on the take home packages for the parents and photocopies but will have to look a bit further if that cost the full \$500 or not.

Follow up question: one of the restrictions was that it couldn't be supplies, so curious **Answer**: Books are an option and supplies for parents were an option, just not supplies for kids.

- Dr. Robert Plaxton Elementary School:

- Planning some sessions with Dr. Robin Bright in the fall for a literacy evening, they
 may have scheduled 2 sessions, but nothing has been confirmed as their School
 Council meeting is next week to finalize.
- Also planning on getting in the Division session, but not sure if the School Council confirmed that or not.

Dr. Gerald B. Probe Elementary School:

- The final School Council meeting is this Wednesday
- Originally going to partner with SJF for a Book Club, but they are moving towards the Division wide presentation in the fall.

- Senator Buchanan Elementary School:

- They didn't make a decision and feel that it could be too late as Senator is not fully opened yet and it's a bit hard.
- They have one more School Council, but it's a dinner meeting.

Comment: it's not too late, there is still time, you have until mid to late June to spend the \$500.

- Senator Joyce Fairbairn Middle School:

- They were going to bring in psychologist to come in on the 3rd week of June to speak on screens but ended up not doing it. They are thinking about bringing in the psychologist in September. The psychologist was going to be speaking on screens for the first time and needed a lot of prep time and were worried that there wouldn't be a lot of parents engaged at the end of June.
- They spent the money on books for the Book Club. The book is called 'Glow Kids: How screen addiction is hijacking our kids and How to break the trance'.
- o In the fall they will start the Book Club.

Question: How much money did you spend on the books?

Answer: the books are about \$20 each, they bought off Amazon, which was 30 books, and the school matched the number of books and the school will buy more if there are more parents.

Question: would you do more than one book?

Answer: Their Council talked about that and if this is successful, they will continue to do it with different education topics.

Nicholas Sheran Elementary School:

- They brought in a provision psychologist to speak
- Thought that they vetted, but unfortunately his language was too colourful and couldn't use the recording to send out to parents.
- They are going to use left over funds to buy some books, one called 'Worrying to much is like a Tomato Plant', this is good for Elementary School age kids to help with anxiety. Along with some other books. [What to Do When You Worry Too Much: A Kids Guide to Overcoming Anxiety by Dawn Huebner].
- Hoping to do a numeracy night next year as well.

- G.S. Lakie Middle School:

 They had someone from the Division come in and teach about mental health. She gave a great presentation with different ideas, resources, and some alternative ways to treat anxiety. There were fidgets on the table during the presentation. But cannot book her for next year as she is retiring.

Onboard for Save the Kids next fall

- Chinook High School:

- Brainstormed a bunch of ideas, but ultimately the decision was made by the staff on how to spend the grant money. Parents did share their frustrations around that piece and hopefully that is resolved for next year.
- The money was spent to pay for 6 translators for a parent engagement night.
- Will be following up with the Chinook as to how that went with the addition of translators and was it beneficial.
- Onboard for Save the Kids next fall.

- Galbraith Elementary School:

- There hasn't been a set decision on how to spend the \$500.
- o The next School Council meeting is next Tuesday, so there is still time.
- o Talked about a Book Club and a presenter
- May be giving back that book

Comment: S.R. can give a copy of Glow Kids to M.D. to take to their next meeting and there are a lot of books about different topics that could work as well. Wilson did a survey with 5 books and from those survey results that they could do a book study on.

Wilson Middle School:

Wilson has purchased tables to host Parent Engagement events.

- Immanuel Christian Secondary School:

- They have a new Chair who will be meeting with the Principal tomorrow and will ask if they have spent the grant
- They have one more School Council meeting, so if it hasn't been spent, they could come up with a creative meeting.

- Fleetwood-Bawden Elementary School:

- o Applied some of the money to an ASCA Workshop on School Council Purpose.
- The rest of the money is going toward building a Parent Resource Library, they have a list of books to have on hand for parents to borrow.

Question: What way would you have parents sign out the books?

Answer: At their school, in the past, they had a lending library in the entrance. This was very informal. They talked about putting it there or if they should do in the library, but people are not going in the school. They are using this year's money to lay the foundation for something that will be useful for the next year. They are thinking it will just be in the entrance and be based on the honor system. Have parents sign out the book and return in a reasonable time.

Comment: another parent suggested to keep it in the office and put in the newsletter each month as to what is available.

Final Comment: TRY NOT TO SEND THE MONEY BACK, buy some books before the end of the year. There is the \$250 that is generally used to send someone to ASCA, but you can use that for food for an event if you don't send someone to ASCA and you don't have to use it all for ASCA.

Question: If the Society was dissolved into the School Council do you have to report on everything? Society wrote a check to Council at the start of the year.

Answer: It depends on what the date of that, you can reach out to the Division or Admin Resources. S.R. We haven't had a Society that has dissolved before, but if all the money is through Council and the School, then it has to be reported. The Society money is accountable to Alberta Services Registry and goes through their process.

 - This is a new form this year

 - This mainly has to do with the provincial engagement grant.

Question: What is the difference between the 1002.4.3 and the Balance Sheet, 1002.4.2? **Answer**: it does seem redundant, but it's the \$500 that was added and that is the only difference.

Question: Do we attach photocopies of receipts?

Answer / Action: They will check on whether or not receipts need to be included and sent that out in an email.

Question: The \$250 does that go on the Balance Sheet (1002.4.2) or the School Council Statement of Receipts and Disbursements (1002.4.3)

Answer: I think it goes on both. They are similar, but the 1002.4.3 **Question**: Should these forms be emailed to a particular email?

Answer: You can send it to the Principal, you can include it on the minutes as well. You can drop it off at the Division email. You could also scan it and send it to LeeAnne as well, it's just a matter that they have it.

- Discussed inflation and financial barriers for families and that costs are rising.
- Talked about specific request for physical donations, there are some things that people need, and we could ask for those specific items.
- The Wholesale Club donated to the WAM Bag program and will offer discounts in the future, this will be a great partnership!!!
- Received the financial report, they have a surplus.
- The Trustee stressed the importance bus transportation being available to everyone.
- Said goodbye to 2 committee members, they were thanked or their many years of service and their impact on the committee.
- They held a celebration of the contributions of all the members.
- Every year in the newspaper, radio and in social media, they send out mentions to the sponsor and those who contribute to the poverty intervention in our Division.
- There was a 2021 review slide show created, will ask if the Division can send it out to the School Councils to promote the work that is being done by the Committee.

Question: Wondering how the WAM Bags get distributed?

Answer: The WAM Bags are distributed to the families by the schools Administration. If a family is in need, they will contact their school, the Admin will handle that distribution, get them the bags that they need. There is a limit on how many times they can access the WAM Bags.

12. Superintendent's Report

12.1 The Loop June 2022

- There is a copy of the Loop, you can reference
- Update to the Staffing Process:
 - From a teachers perspective, towards the end of April, budgets were released to schools, and they create their allocations once the budget is done.
 - They offer contracts, probationary contracts, and continuing contracts.
 - Once that was done, they did the round 1 hiring, on May 9th.
 - The Division advertised for approximately 18 open probationary positions in that first round.
 - o Round 2 was for the temporary positions, approximately 12 positions.
 - They are now advertising for positions that are available due to movement of teachers between schools.
 - For support staff, the Inclusive Education and HR department go over every school's needs. They provide the allocation, and they are into their round one hiring.
 Interviewing support staff all week.
 - In May there was 1567 applications, it could be 1 person applying for multiple jobs, but all separate applications. In the first week of June, they are at 273 applications, each application gets reviewed, short lists are created, then go through the interview process. There is a lot of work this time of year.
 - The highest number of applications for one position was 111 applications.

Question: Today there was posting for the psychologist posted, is that a full-time position for the division or a contact?

Answer: Yes, but it's a replacement position.

Question: What is the criteria that they are looking for new teachers, how do new teachers fresh out of University get noticed?

Answer: The reality is that most of their resume looks the same for those out of University, so how does yours stand out. It has a lot to do with the cover letter and how you tailor it to the position. There is a lot of generic cover letters, but if you see that they have learned about the school, or learned about the programs, learned about how important literacy is. Also, if you can get the sub work and get to be known, that makes a difference and lastly, keep on it. The first round is a feeding frenzy, but then later there are more opportunities that come later. A lot of new teachers are a temporary contract, for example if someone is off for 4 days, but then that person could end up being out for longer and that position can turn into a position. We have incredible people who want to work for the Division and good people coming into the position.
