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INDIGENOUS CANADA ONLINE COURSE

Indigenous Canada is a 12-lesson Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) from the Faculty of Native Studies at the University of Alberta that explores the different histories and contemporary perspectives of

Indigenous Peoples living in Canada. From an Indigenous perspective, this course explores complex experiences Indigenous Peoples face today from a historical and critical perspective highlighting national and local Indigenous-settler relations.

Topics for the 12 lessons include the fur trade and other exchange relationships. land claims and environmental impacts, legal systems and rights, political conflicts and alliances, Indigenous political activism, and contemporary Indigenous life, art and its expressions.

BOARD CHAIR MESSAGES



As a new school year starts off Golden Hills School Division Board of Trustees take immense pride in the remarkable efforts our teachers make within the division, dedicated to enhancing student learning. Golden Hills School Division (GHSD) offers unique Teacher Collaborative Days which are integrated into our school calendar. Four days every school year are designated for all GHSD teachers to meet in their grade or subject level teams to work on improving student learning.

These days are designed for teachers to work collaboratively together, share ideas, and build resources focused on three key drivers of our Powerful Learning Framework which are Strategic Instruction, Authentic Engagement and Connecting and Contributing. Collaborative Days create a sense of belonging and are a support structure for our teachers.

During Collaborative Days GHSD teachers work together and create year long plans with the focus of improving achievement and deep understanding. When thinking about deep understanding our teachers reflect on these five points from Michael Fullan's work that GHSD has adapted:

- 1. Learning that involves surface, deep and the transfer of ideas.
- 2. Learning that sticks
- 3. Learning that is built on innovation relative to key problems and issues
- 4. Learning that engages the world to change the world
- 5. Learning that creates citizens of tomorrow today

A few examples of this years focused worked are infusing critical thinking in the classroom, implementing visible thinking strategies, land-based learning, and powerful assessment. Golden Hills School Division looks forward to seeing the growth and improvement of our students this year because of the success of Teacher Collaborative Days.

Artists and Education Funding

Application Deadline: May 1, 2024

The Alberta Foundation for the Arts exists to encourage and support the arts as a significant contributor to quality of life in Alberta.

The Alberta Foundation for the Arts is a public agency and a provincial corporation of the Government of Alberta with a mandate to support and contribute to the development of the arts in Alberta. We provide grant funding to artists and art organizations to encourage the growth and development of the arts sector. We also promote the arts and manage an extensive provincial art collection featuring work from artists all over the province

This funding supports Alberta schools by subsidizing fees of professional Alberta artists of any artistic discipline that provide interactive arts residency projects for grades K-12.

To be eligible for this funding, applicants must be:

- an Alberta school or school jurisdiction recognized by Alberta Education
- operating on a full-time basis


for students in kindergarten through Grade 12

Two or more eligible schools may apply to collaborate on a project when school populations, locations or conditions warrant.

Eligible residency projects must meet the following criteria:

- engage either an Alberta-based individual artist, or a group of artists working together in any artistic discipline who has school residency experience to deliver a program
- provide students access to Alberta's professional artists and their work
- provide an opportunity for students to observe and actively participate in the creative process
- encourage students to discover and express their creative potential
- take place on school property during school
- be five hours to thirty days in duration
- be completed within three months of its commencement date

Program bolsters Canadian school music programs

MusiCounts, a charity associated with The Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences and The JUNO Awards, aims to make music education inclusive, sustainable, and accessible for youth across Canada.

Through the Band Aid Program, MusiCounts provides under-resourced schools with grants of up to \$15,000 worth of musical instruments, equipment, and resources.

Funds may be used to support any approach to music education and purchase any kind of musical instruments.

Schools can apply for support for an existing music program, or schools with no music program may apply to start a new music program.

The application deadline is 11:59 p.m. EST, December 5, 2023.

Fueling Futures

Enbridge's Fueling Futures grant is a community investment program that is guided by a core set of criteria. Enbridge considers donation and sponsorship opportunities in communities where Enbridge operates that meet the following criteria:

- Located primarily within a 20-kilometer (10-mile) radius of their pipeline right-of-way or near their operations.
- The request is of prime importance to the community.
- Beneficial to the greatest possible number of people.
- Significant to the long-term interests of the community.
- Supportive of one of their three core areas that they view as integral for a sustainable community: Safe Communities, Vibrant Communities, Sustainable Communities.

Strengthening the Relationship **Between Students and Nature**

Since 1992, Tree Canada has greened more than 720 schoolyards across the country. With the support of our sponsors, we've turned barren schoolyards into living outdoor classrooms, created arboretums for handson learning and helped reconnect students with the natural world.

Each year, Tree Canada helps schools, community groups, Indigenous communities and municipalities across Canada looking to plant trees or develop green infrastructure through creative projects.

This includes supporting planting projects as well as developing and implementing urban forest best management practices and innovative urban design solutions.

Our grants provide support for community greening, innovation and stewardship initiatives. Grant recipients receive funding and technical support to help start, upgrade, or achieve their greening goals.

Eligible projects receive \$3,500 in funding to cover the cost of purchasing and planting trees and shrubs, site preparation, tree maintenance, planting materials and developing education materials.
