The 2023-2024 academic year has yielded significant gains in High Prairie School Division's Board of Trustees, moving the educational agenda forward. More specifically, the Board has recently focused on policy, engagement, strategic planning, emergency preparedness planning and forming a strategic research partnership surrounding community engagement.

The HPSD Board of Trustees attended a strategic planning session. Their work yielded a confirmation of board priorities, board outcomes and board policies 1 and 11.

Specifically, the Board revisited policy #1, the Mission, Vision and Core Values for the Division. I am happy to report the Board of Trustees has revamped and revitalized this policy. It was approved at the April Board meeting.

Further, the Board has revisited its policy 11. A formalized, systemic and transparent approach to evaluating the Superintendent is outlined in the added appendix. This was also approved at the April Board meeting.


In relation to engagement, HPSD is proud to announce that they are 1 of 7 recipients for the ARN Research Grant. We have partnered with Dr. Emily Milne and her team at MacEwan University in Edmonton. This grant will focus on best practices in community engagement and the study is entitled "Engaging Diverse Stakeholders to Advance Educational Equity". We are looking forward to our partnership with Dr. Milne and MacEwan University.

As a preemptive measure, High Prairie School Division was proud to host Northland, Living Waters, Holy Family Catholic and KTCEA for a tabletop exercise for wildfire preparedness. We were happy to work with our collaborative partners in order to prepare for such an event.

As technology is ever-changing, HPSD redid their website this month. This project, which has been two years in the making, has yielded some nice results. Drop by our website from time to time to keep updated on the changes, as they are still scheduled for the next few weeks.

Currently, we are finishing the installation of vape detectors in our washrooms in our Junior/Senior High and Outreach Schools. We are looking forward to addressing this problem (vaping) with deliberate, well-thought means.

Finally, as Board of Trustees, some of our Trustees have started attending Parent-Teacher Interviews in the schools in attempts to further engage their community. The Trustees set up a table and ensure they are in a high-traffic area to try and reach as many families as possible. All in all, a busy year for everyone in HPSD!

In Parkland School Division we listen and we act!

PARKLAND SCHOOL DIVISION

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I am delighted to share this brief glimpse into our Engagement World. One of our Governance Assurance Outcomes #10 is that 'Stakeholders will have trust and confidence that Trustees Engage, Listen and Advocate'. Our division tagline is 'Where the World Opens Up', and we feel that our engagement events provide a world of opportunity for stakeholders to give us their feedback, celebrations and challenges related to education in Parkland School Division.

In April of every year, we host our Education Planning Day Event, inviting Elders, students, parents, educators, administrators, and community leaders including the Chamber of Commerce, and the Mayors' offices of Stony Plain and Spruce Grove. The purpose of this day is to gather input and feedback to inform our Education Plan. 130 participants sit at mixed tables and rotate their places for the afternoon sessions. Participants are asked to provide their perspectives on the following questions:

- What are your thoughts, generally, about education today?
- What are your thoughts about community, equity, and appreciation for diversity?
- What are your thoughts about effective ways to support mental health?
- What are your thoughts about what students are learning and how they learn it?

Responses are gathered and compiled into themes that find their way into the Education Plan. Participants have expressed an appreciation for a full days' conversation where they can hear and share many perspectives from the lived experiences at the tables.

In March of every year, Trustees host the Student Advisory. The structure and format of the day varies, and this year, we engaged grade 11 students who had been part of the group last year. This afternoon provided a day for students to sit in small groups with trustees and give us their perspectives on their education. Part of the conversation centered around the data collected from their grade 10 survey results related to safe and caring learning environments. The themes gathered will also find their way into the Education Plan. Students expressed an appreciation for the opportunity to be heard and commented on how good it felt to be genuinely listened to!

A new engagement for us this year was our West End Engagement open to school and community from our west end, rural schools of Duffield, Entwistle, Tomahawk, and Wabamun. The focus of the two-hour evening engagement was on the Rural Advantage. Participants provided examples and stories of how the Rural Advantage is present in their schools and communities. This conversation was followed by participants discussing how the Rural Advantage could be enhanced. Parkland County Mayor and council members were also present to listen to the ideas generated. Trustees will now meet with our County counterparts to determine if there are actions that can be taken. Participants expressed appreciation for the opportunity to be heard.

Our engagement events support our Board's commitment to enhancing community and belonging.

Choice in Alberta Education: Challenges and Opportunities for Public Schools

Earlier this year PSBAA hired educator and researcher Dr. Curtis Riep to do a deep dive into the topic of Choice in Alberta Education: Challenges and Opportunities for public schools. Curtis has publicly released the research findings in a thirty-page paper which can be found on our website. 

Braille books are now available to PWPSD students thanks to a group of Grade 5 and 6 students.

After months of hard work, 16 Grade 5 and 6 students from **Bonanza School** have delivered braille books to the library at Crystal Park School in Grande Prairie. What began as a visit from Mrs. Karen Beatty, teacher for the visually impaired through Peace Collaborative Services, has turned into 100 books translated into braille for students from **Peace Wapiti Public School Division**, Grande Prairie Public School Division, Peace River School Division, Holy Family Catholic Regional Division in Peace River and Northern Gateway Public Schools in Whitecourt to enjoy.

Since learning how to braille, the students worked together to translate books they purchased from a used bookstore. They then recorded themselves reading the books, offering students with visual impairments and other disabilities a variety of ways to enjoy the stories. Bonanza School Principal Theresa Simmonds says the students helped edit each other's braille work and critiqued each other's recordings to ensure a high-quality result, and that it took approximately 1400 recordings to

get the perfect audio for all the books.

In addition to braille and audio, students learned how to use a PIAF Picture in a Flash machine to make simple drawings to add to an assortment of the books. The PIAF machine works with the carbon in the ink to raise it off the page, so that those with visual impairments can feel the picture.

On March 12, the students met with Mrs. Beatty and Mrs. Hampton, Crystal Park School librarian, to share and deliver their books, which will be catalogued into the library and available to any student across the five school divisions.

After reflecting on their project, students shared that they are more confident in their writing and editing skills, they enjoyed learning a new language, their empathy for others has grown and that hard work can bring them great happiness.

Bonanza School would like to thank Faking Sanity for its generous deal on the books, Saddle Hills County for the donation of 100 data sticks for the audio recordings, Mrs. Hampton for cataloguing and housing the books, and Mrs. Beatty and the Peace Collaborative Team for bringing them this wonderful project and continuing to support students throughout the Peace Country.

Dr. MacEwan Literary **Arts Scholarship**

Application Deadline: March 3, 2025

This \$7,000 scholarship is awarded annually to a young Albertan writer who shows extraordinary talent in an eligible literary genre and who demonstrates clear educational or training goals.

To be eligible for scholarship funding:

- the applicant must be a resident of Alberta.
- is a Canadian citizen, permanent resident, or Protected Person with an open study permit from inside Canada
- have had a primary residence in Alberta for one full year before applying
- ordinarily live in Alberta for at least six months each year with the exception of attending a formal program of study

Must be 25 years or younger as of the application deadline. Must be enrolled in an eligible writing training program.

Alexander Rutherford Scholarship

Application Deadline: Apply online when the official high school marks are available, and when the applicant is enrolled in full-time post-secondary studies.

This \$2,500 scholarship was named in honour of Alexander Rutherford, who had the distinction of being Alberta's first Premier and Minister of Education. He was known for his strong support of public education, particularly the University of Alberta and his active involvement in community affairs.

To receive this scholarship, a candidate must also meet all of these eligibility criteria:

- be a Canadian Citizen, a Permanent Resident of Canada or Protected Person under
- Canada's Immigration and Refugee Protection Act, (Visa students are not eligible).
- be an Alberta resident, and to be considered an Alberta resident the following conditions must apply:
 - one parent or legal guardian must have maintained permanent residence in Canada for at least 12 consecutive months immediately prior to the applicant commencing a program of study;
 - applicant has maintained permanent residence in Alberta at least 12-months prior to commencing a program of study;
 - applicant is not eligible to receive a scholarship with respect to any grade unless the applicant or the applicant's parent(s)/legal guardian were a resident in Alberta throughout the whole of that grade.
- have completed high school on or after September 30, 1980.
- be enrolled in a full course load in a designated undergraduate post-secondary or an apprenticeship program of at least one semester in length.
